
# A note from the Principal Assistant Headteacher—Mrs Butt

Oracy involves a combination of skills that include speaking, listening, presenting, and responding thoughtfully in conversations. It is more than just a tool for academic performance; it is essential for building confidence, fostering social connections, and

#### The Role of Oracy in Education

Oracy plays a pivotal role in the educational journey of young people. Effective communication is vital for success in the classroom, where students are expected to contribute ideas, ask questions, and articulate their understanding of complex subjects. A well-developed oracy skill set allows students to participate in discussions, present projects with clarity, and express their opinions with confidence.

Recent research highlights that strong oracy skills are closely linked to higher academic achievement. When students engage in verbal reasoning, debate, and discussion, they not only solidify their knowledge but also develop critical thinking abilities. The process of verbally articulating ideas forces students to organise their thoughts, enhancing cognitive development and problem-solving capabilities.

Additionally, oracy fosters collaboration and teamwork. Group discussions and cooperative learning activities depend on the ability to communicate effectively with peers. Students who are proficient in oracy can engage in dialogue that is constructive, ensuring that all voices are heard and valued in the learning process. This strengthens interpersonal relationships and contributes to a positive



classroom environment, where students feel empowered to share their insights and collaborate on shared goals.

#### **Oracy and Social Skills Development**

The power of oracy extends beyond the classroom and into the social spheres of young people's lives. Active listening, which involves focusing on the speaker, interpreting their message, and responding appropriately, is essential for successful communication. This skill fosters empathy and demonstrates respect for others' perspectives, which is crucial for building trust and cooperation.

Oracy also empowers young people to advocate for themselves and others. Whether addressing a teacher, engaging with peers, or voicing opinions in public spaces, the ability to speak clearly and persuasively enables young individuals to stand up for their rights, influence decisions, and engage in social issues that matter to them.

#### **Building Oracy Skills: A Collective Responsibility**



#### Youthcop 2025

On Tuesday 11th February four members of the school's EnvComm attended Hertfordshire County Council's YOUTHCOP - a conference all about climate change - facilitated by Charlotte of En-roads in the first session and then a series of workshops a second session by members of Hertfordshire County Council's Climate Change and Sustainability group. Then in the afternoon there was a careers fair looking at 'Green Careers' that the students were able to tour.

The En-roads session was a role play situation where we were in 'role' as specific global 'players' at a climate conference and it was facilitated by Charlotte in her role as the Secretary-General of the United Nations. <u>https://www.climateinteractive.org/the-en-roads-climate-workshop/</u> We worked in two groups as 'Clean-Tech' and 'Industrialists', alongside students from the other 28 schools present at the conference who made up the other 6 groups in the room. The sense of co-operation in the conference hall was palpable as we tried to work together to get the climate change predictions down to 1.5°C increase with different scenarios and trade-offs, from 'business as usual': <u>https://en-</u>roads.climateinteractive.org/scenario.html?v=25.2.0&p50=0.6

Here is the group of four Year 12 students alongside Charlotte from En-Roads with the overall result of a 1.8°C as the targeted increase, which felt hard-won, and therefore a successful outcome. (Left to Right, Matteo, Freddie, Niamh, Raquelle with Charlotte.)

During the subsequent workshops we found out about the work of Hertfordshire County Council in both adapting to climate change and helping the county to mitigate against climate change. We found out that the average UK citizen produces 8.4 tonnes of carbon per year, and the global average is 6.3 tonnes of carbon. The facilitators used Mike Berners-Lee's book 'The carbon footprint of everything – How bad are bananas?' <u>https://howbadarebananas.com/</u> to help us assess the carbon footprint of different items – it transpired that bananas are much less carbon intensive than other foods! They also introduced the group to an activity created by the Financial Times – entitled 'Can you reach Net Zero by 2050?' <u>https://ig.ft.com/climategame/</u>. Another resource that was used was the Government's Department of Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy simulation activity - https://my2050.energysecurity.gov.uk/?levers=11111111111111

After the Careers Fair in the afternoon, the event closed with an encouraging address from Professor Phil Porter of the University of Hertfordshire, to continue to work for a more sustainable future and to be alert to the good news about the environment and conservation too.

Since the YouthCOP conference, EnvComm have created some 'Just one thing' room checklists to help to reduce our use of resources in school.

## **Sicily Tour**

Sicily Study Tour – 15<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup> February 2025

A group of KS4 and KS5 students thoroughly enjoyed their study tour to Sicily at the start of half-term. This was arranged through the expertise of Rayburn Tours. We hadn't anticipated that Mount Etna would be international news at the same time, however, the steady eruptions from the SW corner of the volcano didn't stop our intended itinerary, and instead made for some dramatic photographs!

Our first day included a visit to a Greek amphitheatre, which pleased our Drama students and the tourist sites of Syracuse and the Isle of Ortigia, where pizzas were sampled and enjoyed.

Our second day was an early start to the island that gave its name to all volcanoes – Vulcano (named after the Roman God of fire), we climbed up to the top of the caldera to better absorb the active fumaroles, with their sulphurous emissions! There was a grand view over the isles to the north of Vulcano, which are extinct volcanoes. We were impressed by the gas monitoring stations on the island, that keep the residents informed of any changes to the likely volcanic activity! In the afternoon we were again tourists, with a visit to Taormina, which has featured in many films and novels for its coastal beauty.

On the Monday, we met with our walking guides and walked a route up 'Etna Nord' to a collapsed lava bubble, all covered with snow, and a thin layer of ash. The walk itself was quite challenging as the snow was deep and the air pressure was low at the c.2000m altitude (875mb was measured by one of the group). It was incredible to experience the vast site that is Mount Etna, with its many craters and lava fields from the many eruptions over time, whilst being aware of a continuing eruption occurring from an active vent.

In the afternoon we weren't able to sample the refreshing waters of Alcantara Gorge, as the heavy rains over the winter had caused some flood damage to the site, however, we were able to appreciate the vertical flutes of basalt and buy some souvenirs for friends and family.

All in all, a stunning experience for students and staff alike.

This Saturday marks Zero Discrimination Day 2025. Founded by the United Nations, it promotes inclusion and equality in all UN member countries, and the right of everyone to live a full and productive life.

The day highlights the need to combat inequalities of all kinds: gender, age, health status, sexual orientation, race and class.

At Tooled Up, celebrating diversity is a key part of our work with parents and schools. Our **resources** are **aimed at** encouraging acceptance and **helping children understand themselves and** the **different groups** in the world around them.

If your child hears or experiences prejudicial language, are they equipped to challenge it? We share tips in <u>Supporting Your Child to</u> <u>Step Away From and Challenge Harmful Talk in Their Peer Group</u>. This resource also includes useful advice for parents whose children are using denigrating language towards groups of people.

For those with primary aged children, we spoke to Vese Ahoghovbia, founder of Philly and Friends who explained the importance of younger children encountering diverse toys and stories in everyday life. Listen to Vesa in this webinar <u>Representation in Early Years Toys</u> and Books.

It is **important for children to be accepting of "non traditional" families** be that their own or that of their peers. Our activity <u>Fantastic</u> <u>Families</u> is a wonderful way to open a conversation and explore different family types with primary aged children.


