On June 20th, a hand-picked group of thirteen keen readers visited Bushey Meads School to take part in the Dacorum Schools' celebration event for the Carnegie Medal, the UK's most prestigious prize for books written for young people.

At the celebration, KLS students had the opportunity to listen to a talk from performance poet Karl Nova. He spoke to students about his journey from London to Nigeria and back, how he fell in love with writing, and the experience of winning a literary award. Students also took part in a creative writing workshop led by Karl, which focussed on using repetition for effect.

This year's shortlist consisted of eight fantastic books, and students endeavoured to read as many as they could before the award was announced. Our students picked The Song Walker by Zillah Bethell as their favourite read, closely followed by Crossing the Line by Tia Fisher.

When the national awards were announced, The Boy Lost in the Maze by Joseph Coelho was named the winner of the Carnegie Medal for Writing (selected by a panel of judges), while Crossing the Line was named the Shadower's Choice (voted on by students nationwide).

Our students were fantastic ambassadors for the school, showing great character, humour and creativity.


