Using the exam specifications:

We would encourage you to use the **exam specifications** to help you focus your revision on your priority areas and also to help you ensure that you revise the whole course before your exams.

Links to the correct exam specification for each subject are included in this booklet, along with the unit codes (e.g. 3.1.2).

- Red/Amber: Tricky; I'm not sure I know this.

Memorise

How to revise:

- ✓ Once you have reviewed your exam specifications, make an exam planner to help you focus on your priority areas. Condense the information (e.g. <u>flashcards</u>, <u>mindmaps</u>...) linked to each statement in the exam specification and use the <u>Leitner system</u> (diagram above) or <u>blank page</u> <u>retrieval</u> to help you <u>memorise</u> the information as you go, leaving at least one week before your exams to focus on <u>applying</u> your knowledge and understanding to past papers.
- ✓ Use your revision guides to find out the information you want to revise, writing about what you're reading and reorganising it (rather than just reading the text repeatedly or highlighting it).
 Quizzing, blank page retrieval and self-testing are some of the most effective ways of revising.
- ✓ Try doing **20 minutes at a time**, chunking your revision into manageable sections (about 4 pages of a revision guide). After each 20-minute segment, close the revision guide and explain the topic out loud, speedily map it out on paper or ask someone to test you (without looking!).

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
13-Week Subject Revision Plans

To support you in your revision, our KLS subject departments have created **13-week subject revision** plans to break down the exam specifications into smaller chunks for you to revise each week, making your revision feel more manageable and to ensure you have revised the whole course by the time the exams start. If you have already started your revision, you may not need to cover every point on each plan but can instead focus on your priority areas. *Links to the 13-week revision plans* for each subject can be found below; KLS student log-in required.

We are conscious that you have 10 or 11 subjects to revise in total and therefore have not prescribed what you should be revising each day; instead, we would encourage you to plan your revision for each week ahead around your other commitments, using the subject revision plans to identify which sections you are going to revise each day and ticking each one off as you complete it.

We have previously talked to you about 3 recommended stages of revision: Condense - Memorise - Apply, and the subject revision plans will support you with this.

- Start by consolidating the information in the topics indicated for that week by condensing it into smaller chunks (e.g. by making <u>flashcards</u>, <u>mind mans</u>, etc).
- Next, use your flashcards to quiz yourself or ask someone else to test you (e.g. using the <u>Leitner</u> system or <u>blank page retrieval</u>) to help you <u>memorise</u> the information.
- The final stage is **applying** your knowledge to exam questions, and links to past papers and mark schemes have been included in the 13-week subject revision plans.

Practice Exam Papers

If you start working through the 13-week subject revision plans after your trial exams finish, at the beginning of February, you will have **condensed** all of the exam content for each subject by the start of April. This will enable you to focus on **memorising** the information and **applying** your knowledge and understanding to practice exam papers from the Easter holidays until the start of your exams. We would recommend the following stages when you start to do practice papers:

- 1. 'Open book, open time': This means using your notes to help you answer the questions and spending as long on the exam paper as you need to complete it.
- 2. **'Open book, closed time':** This means using your notes to help you answer the questions but doing it in the time allowed for that exam paper. (You will find the time allowed on the front of the paper.)
- 3. 'Closed book, closed time': This means doing the exam paper under exam conditions, without looking up any information and within the time allowed for that exam paper.

We would recommend doing <u>at least one</u> practice exam paper at each stage for each subject in the run-up to your exams, using the mark schemes to mark your answers.

- Condense: Condense the facts into small chunks using <u>flashcards</u> with a prompt or question on one side of each card and the information on the other side, or <u>mindmaps</u>.
- Memorise: Use the <u>Leitner system</u> or <u>blank page retrieval</u> to help you memorise the information on your flashcards.
- Apply: Practise applying your knowledge to practice exam papers using the three stages above.

Structure of the exam papers and topics assessed in English Language:

English Language Component 1:

20th Century Literature Reading and Creative Prose Writing (40%)

Section A: Fiction Reading

(10 minutes <u>reading the extract</u> at the beginning of the exam. Do rule off the selected lines within the questions.)

- Question 01 Explicit information retrieval.
 - (5 marks; 5 minutes)
- Question 02 This question tests the ability to explain, comment on and analyse how writers use language to achieve effects.

(5 marks; 5 minutes)

- Question 03 This question tests the ability to explain, comment on and analyse

how writers use language to achieve effects, using relevant subject

terminology where appropriate.

(10 marks; 10 minutes)

 Question 04 Analysis of a character, emerging mood and tone or atmosphere, often shaped as a 'how' question.

(10 marks; 10 minutes)

 Question 05 This question tests the ability to evaluate texts critically and support this with appropriate textual reference. It often asks you to consider the end

of the passage as well as the whole text.

(10 marks; 10 minutes)

Section B: Fiction Writing

(5 minutes considering the options and planning; 40 minutes writing your response.)

Question 1.1 Select a writing prompt from one of the four choices provided.
 (20 marks for content + 16 marks for Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar;
 45 minutes)

English Language Component 2: 19th and 21st Century Non-Fiction Reading and Transactional/Persuasive Writing (60%)

<u>Section A</u>: Non-Fiction Reading

(10 minutes <u>reading both sources</u> at the beginning of the exam.)

- **Question 01** This question tests the ability to identify explicit information. (3 marks; 3 minutes)
- Question 02 This question tests the ability to explain, comment on and analyse how
 writers use language, tone and structure to achieve effects and influence
 readers, using relevant subject terminology to support your views.
 (10 marks; 10 minutes)
- Question 03 This question tests the ability to identify and interpret explicit and implicit information and ideas.
 (3 marks; 3 minutes)
- Question 04 This question tests the ability to evaluate texts critically and support this with appropriate textual references.
 (10 marks; 10 minutes)
- Question 05 This question tests the ability to select and synthesise evidence from different texts.
 (4 marks; 4 minutes)
- Question 06 This question tests the ability to compare writers' ideas and perspectives, as well as how these are conveyed, across the two texts.
 (10 marks; 10 minutes)

• <u>Section B</u>: Non-Fiction Writing

- **Question 2.1** You will be provided with two questions that you must complete.
- Question 2.2 You must write in a method that suits the format, audience and required purpose of each task.

(20 marks each; 30 minutes each including 5 minutes' <u>planning</u> for each question)

- Make sure you know what each non-fiction text looks like and includes that you may be asked to write in the Component 2 exam.
- Keep hold of your cream-coloured sheet that will go through, in detail, your trial examination performance.
- Consult Mr McGuigan or your teacher for past papers, which you should complete in timed conditions and on lined paper to best reflect the real conditions of the examination.

(1 hour in total for this section. It is recommended to spend 5 minutes <u>reading the extract</u> for Question 1, and 20 minutes <u>answering</u> Question 1; 5 minutes <u>planning</u> for Question 2 and 30 minutes <u>answering</u> Question 2.)

- Question 2.1 Analysis of an extract from the play. (15 marks)
- **Question 2.2** Analysis of a wider theme or specific character from the play. (25 marks)
- <u>Section B</u>: Poetry Anthology

(1 hour in total for this section. It is recommended to spend 5 minutes <u>reading the</u> <u>provided poem</u> for Question 1, and 20 minutes <u>answering</u> Question 1; 5 minutes <u>planning</u> for Question 2, and 30 minutes <u>answering</u> Question 2.)

- **Question 7.1** Analysis of a poem from the anthology. (15 marks)
- Question 7.2 Comparison of the previous poem with one you can remember based on a provided theme such as love, war, place or power.
 (25 marks)

English Literature Component 2: Post-1914 Prose/Drama, 19th Century Prose and Unseen Poetry (60%)

- Section A: Post-1914 Prose/Drama: Blood Brothers*
 - Question 10 You will be given an extract from the play and a question to answer.
 The question is often on a given character, relationship or theme.
 Write approximately 1/3rd on the extract and 2/3rds on the wider text.
 (40 marks including 5 marks for Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar)
- Section B: 19th Century Prose: A Christmas Carol*
 - Question 21 You will be given an extract from the text and a question to answer.
 The question is often on a given character, relationship or theme.
 Write approximately 1/3rd on the extract and 2/3rds on the wider text.
 (40 marks including 5 marks for Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar)
- <u>Section C</u>: Unseen Poetry
 - **Question 31** Analysis of a poem provided. (15 marks)
 - Question 32 Comparison of the previous poem with a new one provided based on a clearly-stated theme.
 (25 marks)

'Knowledge organisers' for each English Literature text to support your revision.

Tips for revising in English Literature:

- Re-read your set texts: Macbeth, Blood Brothers and A Christmas Carol.
- Watch the film or stage adaptations of Macbeth, Blood Brothers and A Christmas Carol.
- Secure your understanding of the **plots** of Macbeth, Blood Brothers and A Christmas Carol.
- Secure your understanding of the principal characters in Macbeth, Blood Brothers and A Christmas Carol.
- Ensure your notes on the poems from the Eduqas Poetry Anthology are secure and detailed.
- Make sure you can 'pair up' any two poems based upon selected themes such as nature, love, war, power and place.
- Review all of your old work, including any:
 - o notes about the context or themes of a text;
 - o important quotes; and
 - analysis of literary techniques.
- Then, use those old notes to create a new page of notes for each key character, and each key theme in your text. On each of those pages, you need to write:
 - o a description of that character or theme;
 - o a list of quotes about that character or theme;
 - a brief description of what each quote means; and
 - Textual analysis for each quote, focusing on how the author is using specific literary techniques to emphasise the point you think they are making about the character or theme.
- Know the context, form and structure, language, imagery and themes of all the anthology poems.
- Complete past exam papers and mark them using the mark schemes.

- If you identify a knowledge gap or a question you cannot do when completing a past paper, use your revision guide or the relevant MathsWatch link to find out more about it and write a revision card on the key information. Make a note of the topic so that you can ask your Maths teacher for help on it next lesson.

Information for candidates

Written examinations

With effect from 1 September 2025

This document has been written to help you. Read it carefully and follow the instructions.

If there is anything you do not understand, especially which calculator you may use, ask your teacher.

A. Regulations - Make sure you understand the rules

- 1 Be on time for all your exams. If you are late, your work might not be accepted.
- 2 Do not become involved in any unfair or dishonest practice during the exam.
- 3 If you try to cheat or break the rules in any way, you could be disqualified from all your exams.
- 4 You must not take into the exam room any unauthorised material, including:
 - (a) notes;
 - (b) earphones or earbuds (e.g. AirPods), mobile phones, MP3/4 players or similar devices, smart glasses, tablets (e.g. iPads or iPods);
 - (c) watches.

Any pencil cases taken into the exam room **must** be see-through.

Remember: possession of unauthorised material is breaking the rules, even if you do not intend to use it, and you will be subject to sanctions and possible disqualification.

- 5 Do not use correcting pens, fluid or tape, erasable pens, highlighters or gel pens in your answers.
- 6 Do not talk to or try to communicate with or disturb other candidates once you have entered the exam room.
- 7 You must not write inappropriate, obscene or offensive material.
- 8 If you leave the exam room unaccompanied by an invigilator before the exam has finished, you will not be allowed to return.
- 9 Do not borrow anything from another candidate during the exam.

B. Information - Make sure you attend your exams and bring what you need

- 1 Know the dates and times of all your exams. Arrive at least ten minutes before the start of each exam.
- 2 If you arrive late for an exam, report to the invigilator running the exam.
- 3 If you arrive more than one hour after the published starting time for the exam, you may not be allowed to take it.
- 4 Only take into the exam room the pens, pencils, erasers and any other permitted equipment needed for the exam.
- 5 You must write clearly and in black ink. Coloured pencils or inks may be used only for diagrams, maps, charts, etc, unless the instructions printed on the front of the question paper state otherwise.



C. Calculators, dictionaries and computer spellcheckers

- You may use a calculator unless you are told otherwise.
- 2 If you use a calculator:
 - (a) make sure it works properly; check that the batteries are working properly;
 - (b) clear anything stored in its memory;
 - (c) remove any parts such as cases, lids or covers which have printed instructions or formulae;
 - (d) do not bring into the exam room any operating instructions or prepared programs.
- **3 Do not** use a dictionary or computer spellchecker unless you are told otherwise.

D. Instructions during the exam

- 1 Always listen to the invigilator. Always follow their instructions.
- 2 Tell the invigilator at once if:
 - (a) you think you have not been given the right question paper or all of the materials listed on the front of the paper;
 - (b) the question paper is incomplete or badly printed;
 - (c) you think you have not been given the expected access arrangement(s).
- **3** Read carefully and follow the instructions printed on the question paper and/or on the answer booklet.
- 4 Do not start writing anything until the invigilator tells you to fill in all the details required on the front of the question paper and/or the answer booklet. Do not open the question paper until you are told that the exam has begun.
- 5 Remember to write your answers within the designated sections of the answer booklet.
- **6** Do your rough work on the proper exam stationery. Cross it through and hand it in with your answers.
 - Make sure you add your candidate details to any additional answer sheets that you use, including those used for rough work.



E. Advice and assistance

- 1 If, on the day of the exam, you feel that your work may be affected by ill health or any other reason, tell the invigilator.
- 2 Put up your hand during the exam if:
 - (a) you have a problem and are not sure what you should do:
 - (b) you do not feel well;
 - (c) you need more paper.
- 3 You must not ask for, and will not be given, any explanation of the questions.



F. At the end of the exam

- 1 If you have used more than one answer booklet and/or any supplementary answer sheets, place them in the correct order.
 - Place any loose additional answer sheets inside your answer booklet. Make sure you add your candidate details to any additional answer sheets that you use. For CCEA examinations, any loose additional answer sheets should be placed **behind** your script.
- 2 Do not leave the exam room until told to do so by the invigilator.
- **3 Do not** take any stationery from the exam room. This includes the question paper, answer booklets (used or unused), rough work or any other materials provided for the exam.
