

The five practices and ten commitments of exemplary leadership

Modelling exemplary student behaviour in lessons, 1 around the school and within the community **MODEL** Being a role model by representing the school and championing our values. Lead projects or initiatives that inspire or encourage others. **INSPIRE** Motivate and inspire others to participate through promoting equality and inclusiveness. Identify ways of improving our school community 5 using effective channels and voice. **CHALLENGE** Challenge yourself by taking risks that enable you 6 and/or others to develop. Provide opportunities for other people to learn, grow 7 or develop. **ENABLE** 8 Develop competence and/or confidence in others. Encourage other students to participate in activities 9 or opportunities. **ENCOURAGE** Contribute to the wider culture of collaboration 10 within the school and wider community.

For each type of leadership role, there is a challenge page. Read through the challenges and complete as many as possible. If you complete 5 of the leadership challenges for a specific leadership role and you will be awarded **Accomplished Leadership level**, complete them all and you will be awarded **Leadership Excellence** level.

If you hold a leadership role, these are an excellent way of showing your commitment to the role. If you are not yet a leader, you can still complete these challenges as it gives you a fantastic experience of what it is like to be a leader—you might even enjoy it that much that you want to apply for an official leadership role!

Subject Ambassadors

What is a SUBJECT AMBASSADOR?

A subject ambassador is a passionate advocate of the subject who is a role model for others across the school. The subject ambassadors play an important role in engaging other students in the subject, offering support, and bridging communication between students and teaching staff. The subject ambassador role enhances community, promotes the subject's value, and inspires academic excellence.

What does a SUBJECT AMBASSADOR do?

A subject ambassador is the student representation for a subject area. They work with the subject leader and subject staff on developing opportunities such as competitions, contributing to the development of the curriculum, help run or lead clubs or societies, as well as contribute to developing access to the subject for students of all backgrounds and abilities.

What do I need to be a SUBJECT AMBASSADOR?

- A passion for the subject
- An interest in thinking about exciting ways to inspire and encourage other students to enjoy the subject
- A desire to achieve and succeed in the subject
- The potential to want to have a career connected to this subject area
- Skills or ability in the subject that other people can learn from
- Ideas about how to make the subject more accessible to others

School Council

What is a SCHOOL COUNCIL LEADER?

Being a member of the school council is an important role which provides you with the opportunity to be at the forefront of whole school initiatives and projects. You are the representation of student voice from your form and you will play a significant role in developing student voice. School council leaders work directly with a member of the senior leadership team who then reports to the Headteacher and the governing body.

What does a SCHOOL COUNCIL LEADERS do?

A member of the school council will work on projects, initiative or suggestions for change and improvement across the school community. School council leaders provide a voice for the student body and represent the opinions and views of students.

School council leaders are expected to attend school council meetings ONCE EVERY HALF TERM. School council leaders are then also expected to feed back to members of their form, the topics, discussions, actions, and projects that the school council is working on.

Library Leaders

What is a LIBRARY LEADER?

School student library leaders play a vital role in promoting literacy and fostering a love for reading. They assist in organizing library events, manage resources, and encourage peer engagement. By cultivating a supportive learning environment, they enhance students' academic success and personal growth through increased access to literature.

What does a LIBRARY LEADER do?

The role of a library leader can be wide-ranging and diverse but could include contributing or leading on the following activities:

- Helping to run an efficient library and resource centre
- Help cataloguing books, periodicals and magazines
- Organising book fairs and reading challenges
- Promoting literacy through book recommendations, reading campaigns
- Helping other student leaders to identify how literacy can be developed in subject areas
- Create a warm and welcoming library environment for other students
- Promote the Reading & Oracy KLS Colour Award

What do I need to be a LIBRARY LEADER?

- An interest in reading, oracy or books
- A warm and friendly disposition
- The desire to help other students
- The ability to communicate the importance of literacy and oracy skills

Equality Leaders

What is an EQUALITY LEADER?

A student equality leader in secondary school champions inclusivity and addresses discrimination, advocating for equal opportunities for all students. They work to create a supportive and respectful environment by organizing awareness campaigns, facilitating discussions on diversity and equality, and collaborating with peers and staff to implement inclusive policies and practices.

What does an EQUALITY LEADER do?

An equality leader is an important role where they use student voice to identify where change needs to take place, where systems and policy needs to be challenged, and to help promote and celebrate equality and diversity so that everyone can express themselves and celebrate their backgrounds and communities. Equality leaders will attend meetings, plan celebration events, develop equality events, and contribute to the development of school policy to cultivate greater community cohesion and a culture of belonging.

What do I need to be a EQUALITY LEADER?

- The desire to make positive change in the school for yourself and others
- The confidence or the desire to develop confidence in representing peoples views and opinions
- An interest in working with others on change

- An open-mind

Form Captains

What is a FORM CAPTAIN?

A form captain is an important position in the registration system as well as being a student representative of each registration group. A form captain will be there to support the form tutor in daily tasks and be a voice for peers in the form. Form captains also help foster teamwork, responsibility, and a sense of community within the class.

What does a FORM CAPTAIN do?

A form captain will assist the form tutor in daily tasks which could include things such as, emptying the form pigeon hole, passing on form messages, collecting registers, representing the form at meetings, being a contact for the House Captains, promoting House competitions and events.

How do I become a FORM CAPTAIN?

- Being a warm and friendly person who can represent others in your form
- Organisation skills
- Reliability and good attendance
- The confidence or the desire to develop confidence in representing peoples views and opinions
- An interest in working with peers

House Captains

What is a HOUSE CAPTAIN?

A House Captain is someone who supports form captains and assists with the whole-school House system. The House Captain increases the sense of community spirit and encourages students of all ages to get involved in the schools extra-curricular activities and events. A House Captain is a figurehead for students across all years groups across a House i.e., 7A, 8A, 9A, 10A, and 11A.

What does a HOUSE CAPTAIN do?

A House Captain will help form captains to promote House events, competitions, collect sponsorships, assist Pastoral Leaders, support positive recognition events for the House.

How do I become a HOUSE CAPTAIN?

To become a house captain you must be a Sixth Form (Yr12 or Yr13). House Captains are recruited in September each year. You could however, apply for a House Captain position and be placed on a waiting list. Complete a leadership application form online.

What do I need to be a HOUSE CAPTAIN?

- A sense of community spirit
- The ability and confidence to speak to students across the school community
- A positive approach to extra-curricular
- Commitment to attending House events
- A positive and outgoing disposition would be advantageous
- A 'can-do' attitude to getting involved in school and community activities and events

Sixth Form Student Leadership

What is a SIXTH FORM STUDENT LEADER?

Sixth Formers at Kings Langley are role models to the lower school and as such, every Yr12 student is expected to undertake a leadership role of some kind. These leadership roles will vary and it will depend on each student's interests as well as areas of leadership that they wish to exercise or develop.

Leadership roles include:

- Environment Committee
- Reading and Literacy Leaders
- Pastoral Ambassadors
- Marketing & Social Media Leaders
- Health Ambassadors
- Mental Health Ambassadors
- Access-ibility Ambassadors
- House Captains

What does a SIXTH FORM STUDENT LEADERS do?

It depends on the leadership role but, every Sixth Form student leader will assist with the Sixth Form culture and contribute to the wider school community. Some leadership roles will be student facing, some will be behind the scenes, and some will be community facing in an almost, advocacy capacity.

How do I become a SIXTH FORM STUDENT LEADER?

In Sixth Form everyone is expected to be a leader in some form. This may be a formal position like the ones that are listed in this passport booklet or they may be more bespoke.

To be a member of the Sixth Form Leadership Team (SFLT) you will need to go through the official application, campaign and voting process. To be eligible for this, you must have successfully maintained a leadership role throughout Yr12.
